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Message from the Principal

As the 2022 academic year comes to end, it is time to reflect on the year that was and look ahead to 2023. Covid continued to play havoc with our programs at the start of the year, and unfortunately has become an issue as the year draws to a close. Nevertheless, 2022 has been exciting year at the Darwin Languages Centre.

At the start of the year, with our language programs in full swing, we celebrated Harmony week with every student receiving a pair of Harmony Day orange socks. The week ended with our Harmony Day Connecting Cultures Festival. It was a celebration of our multicultural community, with performances from dozens of community groups. It was a huge success, and we really appreciated the support of the Darwin community.

In Term 3, we ran a series of Survivor Programs in Indonesian, Japanese and Mandarin. These programs are designed to get students to use the language they are learning in a fun and interesting way. Over 400 students visited the Centre to take part in these survivor programs.

This term we celebrated our 10th Anniversary at the Ludmilla Campus. We were delighted to welcome the founding Principal, Carol Bursa. When Carol was the Principal, the school was located at Nightcliff Middle school and was called the NT School of Languages. Ten years ago, the school moved to our current site with Jeannie Bennett responsible for setting up the classrooms and our beautiful surrounds. We had a short ceremony to recognise this milestone and recognise the contribution of these two past Principals.

Why Learn a Language?

In many parts of the world, school systems have chosen to make learning a second language and, in some countries, even a third language a requirement. In some other states in Australia, the learning of a language is mandated up to Year 8.

We live in a multilingual world, yet in Australia many people have a monolingual mindset, and they are normalised to think that English is the world's language and that's all that they need know. There is no denying the importance of English. However, learning another language is about recognising one of the realities of life – that is 94% of the world's population currently speak a language other than English.

In Australia more than 200 different languages are spoken and it is through learning Languages that students can understand and value their own culture and the cultures of other people. They start to view the world from a wider perspective and appreciate and respect the different ways of thinking and being. This is just one example of the benefits of learning a language.

It is often forgotten that learning an additional language can also develop English literacy skills. By comparing features of their first language with those of another language, learners are better able to understand the structure and workings of English. They also develop the skills and strategies to decode and make meaning from words and this skill transfers to English. One of the best things about learning another language is that it can be lots of fun!

I hope your children have enjoyed learning languages at the Darwin Languages Centre this year and wish you and your families all the best for the festive season.
